When your child enters primary school, their experience will include:



Smoothening the Transition to Primary 1

1. Transition is the process in which a child moves into a new environment

2. When moving from pre-school to primary, a child will have to adapt to unfamiliar setting and routines

When your child has transited well, he/she will:

- Feel safe and comfortable in the new environment
- Be able to manage daily challenges
- Be able reach out to teachers and/ or peers for support when needed

First Two Weeks Of School

First Day: 2 Jan 2026, Friday

Second Week: 5 Jan – 9 Jan 2026, Monday - Friday











First Day of School: 2 Jan 2026 (for P1s only)

Day 1

- P1 students assemble at Parade Square.
- Parents may wait at the side.
- Teachers will guide students to their seating area.
- Students do silent reading.
- Form Teachers will fetch students in batches to class.

Day 2 Onwards

- Students to walk into school independently.
- Teachers & Prefects stationed at gates.
- They will guide students to the assembly area.

What to Bring?

Bring only the stipulated books for each day. Ensure that name and class are written on all books.

Bring a story book for silent reading before flag raising ceremony. Bring healthy snacks for 10-minute Snack Time.

- Extended recess for P1s to adjust to school environment and routines.
- Teachers will be around to guide and assist students.

First Week Recess 9.00 am - 10.00am













Second Week Recess: Buddy System

- Each P1 paired with a P4 buddy (same gender).
- Buddy helps P1s navigate recess and routines.
- P4s are trained and supportive.
- Builds safety, confidence, and responsibility.

Snack Break (10 minute)



12.00pm – 12.30pm



Pack simple, healthy snacks (sandwich, bun, cookie, fruit).



Snacks should not need preparation or lots of cleaning.



Not allowed: sweet drinks, sweets, chocolate.



No sharing of snacks because of dietary needs and allergies.







School Dismissal

- Parents/Guardians who are picking your children/wards during school dismissal, are to wait for them <u>outside Gate 4 or</u> <u>Gate 1</u>.



Attendance, Punctuality & Communication

Attendance

- Daily attendance is compulsory.
- •Consistent & regular attendance supports learning & routine.
- •Submit MC for all absences (only 5 parents' letter allowed per semester).
- Inform Form
 Teacher early if child is absent.

Punctuality

- •Report by **7.30am.**
- Helps students settle and start the day smoothly.

When child is unwell

- •Keep child at home.
- •Inform FT and submit reason of absence (MC or parents' letter).

What is SLS?


Our national online learning portal with curriculum-aligned resources for students to learn at their own pace and collaboratively.



School Attire and General Appearance

For Girls:

Short hair must be kept neat and the back of the hair should not go below the shirt collar.

Fringe should not touch the eyebrows.

Long hair should be neatly tied up with plain dark blue or black hair accessories.

May wear only one pair of simple ear studs either in gold or silver.

For Boys:

Must be clean shaven and no wearing of beard and moustache.

Hair must be kept short and neat.

Fringe should not touch the eyebrows.

No dyeing, colouring or highlighting of hair is allowed.

No wearing of jewellery or accessories except a simple watch.






